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Noosa Parks Association Inc. Bird Observers Group ANNUAL REPORT 2022



Throughout 2022, the general public has again benefited from the collaboration this group has with Friday Forum. The five bird related speaker subjects provided, attracted good numbers. Professor Richard Fuller's presentation covered details of local and migratory birds seen at sea, as well as seabird conservation on Raine, Lord Howe and Macquarie Islands. Sunshine Coast Ground Parrot status was the subject of Kieran Aland's presentation. The distribution of the S. C. population has declined. Habitat size and connectivity matters to this species. Angus Innes spoke of how millions of migrating land and water birds are killed annually. His presentation titled 'Carnage on the Flyways' was particularly about the African Eurasian Flyway including Malta Cyprus and Italy. New laws with heavier penalties are now in place. Peter Odekerken's presented beautiful bird photos of Columbia and the Amazon. Columbia is the location of the country containing the most bird species. It boasts of 1,884 bird species, which is 16.9% of global total! Richard Howard's presentation of 'Noosa's Threatened Shorebirds' concentrated on the waders of the Noosa River. There are 66 Ramsar sites in Australia. The Noosa estuary is between the Great Sandy and Moreton Bay Ramsar sites. Woondum National Park, Cooran was a new and interesting outing site attended by 17 people, recording 38 bird species. Thanks to Russ for this suggestion and leadership. The May outing to survey the Koala Corridor was cancelled due to heavy flooding rain. The narrow Emu Mt. track, a section Noosa National Park, attracted 18 observers who recorded 42 bird species. A group of 19 enjoyed visiting the private 'Hidden Valley' property to observe an amazing 65 bird species. Another private property, at Cooloothin also attracted 19 members recording 37 bird species. Butterfly sightings and the hospitality of property owners was enjoyed and appreciated by everyone. The average attendance for the four outings was 18, while the average specie count was 45 – both slightly lower than the previous year. The number of Flying Fox visiting Wallace Park in 2022 was less than the previous huge colony of 2021. That has allowed the Melaleuca trees to slowly recover. An average of 12 people attended the 16 surveys to record an average of 25 species. Butterfly sightings and interesting bird activities make this walk a popular exercise. Members also surveyed Harry Springs, Kauri Park, Noosa Banks, Eumundi Conservation Park, and Great Sandy National Park, during the year to record an average of 28 bird species. All data has been entered to eBird thanks to Angela. As Spencer and Maxine continue to fight for Glossy Black-Cockatoo habitat, their request to have the species 'declared' has been successful. Not only has the South-eastern Glossy Black-Cockatoo now been listed as vulnerable on the threatened species list under Environmental law. This listing is supported by a commitment of more than \$200 million to help arrest species decline and restore populations of endangered plants and animals. Spencer also proposed that we form a Threatened Species group to educate and promote awareness. NPA Management has given approval for the formation of a group within Noosa Parks Bird Observers. It will be known as Noosa Parks Ass. Threatened Species Group. The 2022 year has been interesting and rewarding for this group as new members join and we continue to study and understand our local birds and protect their habitat. V.McLean
